NYS DOH Statewide Health Care Facility Transformation Project IV Funding Available

On January 9, 2024, the New York State Department of Health announced the availability of funds under the **Statewide Health Care Facility Transformation Program IV**, established pursuant to Section 2825-g of the Public Health Law.

A total of up to \$250,000,000 is available through Request for Applications (RFA #20244) to health care providers in support of capital projects, debt retirement, working capital or other non-capital projects that facilitate furthering transformational goals, including, but not limited to, transforming, redesigning, and strengthening quality health care services in alignment with statewide and regional health care needs and in the ongoing pandemic response, or other activities intended to build innovative, patient-centered models of care, to increase access to care, to improve the quality of care and to ensure financial sustainability of health care providers.

Eligible Applicants include:

- Hospitals
- Residential care facilities
- Adult care facilities
- Assisted living programs
- Children's residential treatment facilities licensed by the Office of Mental Health (OMH), and residential facilities or day program facilities licensed by the Office for People With Developmental Disabilities (OPWDD).
- Eligible Applicants also include community-based health care providers which include
 diagnostic and treatment centers, home care providers, primary care providers,
 independent practice associations or organizations, hospice providers, outpatient clinics
 licensed by OMH, the Office of Addiction Services and Support (OASAS) or OPWDD, and
 community-based programs funded by OMH, OASAS, OPWDD or through local
 governmental units.

The **Statewide Health Care Facility Transformation Program IV** RFA can be accessed through the New York State Department of Health website at http://www.health.ny.gov/funding/, or through the Grants Gateway website at http://grantsreform.ny.gov. Applications must be submitted in Grants Gateway by 4:00 PM EST on March 26, 2024.

Master Plan for Aging General Public Survey extended through January 31, 2024

Due to the recent surge in enthusiasm and overwhelming response from survey participants, the

survey period for the Master Plan for Aging survey will be extended through January 31, 2024.

Since the launch of New York State's Master Plan for Aging (MPA) survey, NYS has received an unprecedented level of engagement from stakeholders, providers, advocates, and community members. To date, more than 5,000 survey responses have been received. This valuable input has provided a wealth of ideas and suggestions that will greatly contribute to the development of the MPA. NYS is thrilled by the enthusiasm shown and want to ensure that everyone has a chance to participate. The State will be working with their stakeholder partners on in-person survey events and on further promotion to their constituencies so that all older New Yorkers and New Yorkers with disabilities can have their voices heard.

New York State Electronic Cigarette Use Data Released

The New York State Department of Health recently announced the release of a new data product based on data from the New York Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System (BRFSS), entitled "BRFSS Brief: Electronic Cigarette Use among NYS Adults, 2021". Electronic cigarettes (ecigarettes) are devices used to heat and aerosolize highly addictive nicotine or other substances that a person can inhale into their lungs. The use of an e-cigarette is generally referred to as "vaping."

The key finding within this data includes that the prevalence of e-cigarette use among adults in New York State was 5.3% in 2021, compared to national average of 6.1%. Statewide, e-cigarette use was highest among adults between the ages of 18-24, at 15.1%. Our local communities continue to be disproportionately burdened by tobacco use. The adult e-cigarette-use rates for our local area include Saratoga County at 7.2%, Warren County at 6.0%, and Washington County at 8.7%.

The Clear the Air in the Southern Adirondacks (CASA) program of the Adirondack Health Institute (AHI) continues to engage our local community to provide education on the impact of commercial tobacco product marketing and use. Youth Mental Health First Aid Training February 9, 2024

The North Country Care Coordination Collaborative (NCCCC) will be offering a Youth Mental Health First Aid (YMHFA) on February 9 from 8:30am to 4:30pm in the CVPH Board Room.

YMHFA, an evidence-based course, prepares attendees to support young people in their lives. You'll learn how to identify, understand, and respond to mental health and substance use challenges, among adolescents 12-18. You'll build skills and confidence to use with youth who are struggling. You'll also learn how to connect them with appropriate support.

AFTER THE COURSE, YOU'LL BE ABLE TO:

- Recognize common signs and symptoms of mental health challenges, including anxiety, depression, eating disorders and attention deficit hyperactive disorder (ADHD).
- Recognize common signs and symptoms of substance use challenges.
- Understand how to interact with a young person in crisis.
- Know how to connect a young person with help.
- Better understand trauma, substance use, self-care and the impact of social media and bullying

The instructor will be Bonnie Black, Trainer/Consultant in suicide prevention/intervention/postvention. She is the Chair of the Clinton County Coalition to Prevent Suicide, Coordinator of the County Postvention Team, AFSP Capital Region Board Member and North Country Regional Leader for In-School Programming for the NYS Office of Mental Health.


Using Public Health to Ensure Dementia Early Detection & Diagnosis TUESDAY, APRIL 16TH 12PM
